2023 Advent Meditations

As has been the custom for many years here at CLS, a harvest of short readings, poems and prayers is presented to the congregation and friends to savor during a busy Advent season... my thanks to all who contributed.—Maureen McGovern

December 3 (First Sunday of Advent) - Circle me Lord, keep protection near and danger afar. (Rev. David Adam, 1936-2020 CE, Anglican priest and writer of prayers in the Celtic pattern)

December 4—We live as feathers on the breath of God. (*Letter to Odo of Soissons*, Hildegard of Bingen, 1098-1179 CE, German Benedictine Abbess, writer, composer, philosopher and mystic)

December 5—People who pray for miracles usually don't get miracles any more than children who pray for bicycles, good grades or good boyfriends get them as a result of praying...But people who pray for courage, for strength to bear the unbearable, for the grace to remember what they have left instead of what they have lost very often find their prayer answered. (Rabbi Harold Kushner, 1935-2023 CE, American rabbi and author-*When Bad Things Happen to Good People*)

December 6—Your days are numbered. Use them to throw open the windows of your soul to the sun. (Marcus Aurelius, 121-180 CE, Roman Emperor and follower of Stoic philosophy of logic, ethics and temperance)

December 7—In the Gospels Jesus is asked 187 questions. He answers (maybe) 8 of them. He himself asks 307 questions. Maybe faith isn't about certainty but learning to ask and sit in the complexity of good questions. (Kevin Nye, American writer on theology, grace and homelessness)

December 8—Music doesn't get in. Music is already in. Music simply uncovers what is there, makes you feel emotions you didn't necessarily know you had inside you and runs around waking them up. A re-birth of sorts. (*How to Stop Time*, Matt Haig, English author and journalist author)



December 9—Drink tea and nourish life; with the first sip, joy; with the second sip, satisfaction; with the third sip, peace; with the fourth sip, a Danish. (*The Jewish Buddha*)

December 10 (Second Sunday of Advent)—Circle me Lord, keep hope within and keep doubt without. (Rev David Adam, 1936-2020 CE, Anglican priest and writer of prayers in the Celtic pattern)

December 11—It is Hope who carries Faith and Love. It is Hope who moves the world. (Charles Peguy, 1873-1914 CE, French poet and essayist)

December 12—Silence is essential. We need silence just as much as we need air, just as much as plant need light. If our minds are crowded with words and thoughts, there is no space for us. (Thich Nhat Hanh, 1926-2022 CE, Vietnamese Buddhist monk, poet and peace activist)

December 13—My deepest vocation is to be a witness to the glimpses of God I have been allowed to catch. (Henri Nouwen, 1932-1996 CE, Dutch Catholic priest, theologian, author)

December 14—Hate has talked so loudly for so long. Greed has talked so loudly for so long. Liars have talked so loudly for so long. Love has got to stop whispering. (Marianne Williamson, American spiritual leader and author)

December 15—God of Hope, Help us not to despair at the brokenness of this world. Remind us that your healing presence is at all times in all things. (Church of Scotland)

December 16—Going to church doesn't make you a Christian any more than standing in a garage makes you a car. (Attributed to Winston Churchill, 1874-1965 CE, British statesman and author)

December 17 (Third Sunday of Advent)—Circle me Lord, keep light near and darkness afar. (Rev David Adam 1936-2020 CE, Anglican priest and writer of prayers in the Celtic pattern)

December 18—Any time is a good time to pray, "prayer" will look, feel, sound...unique to each person because it is a unique conversation between that individual and their higher power. Sometimes that thing doesn't have a name and "prayer" doesn't fit, worry less about that. Instead, make space for intentional connection with something greater than yourself. Nature, music, breathing...may you find the space and connection that nourishes you at your core. (Reverend Cairn Neely, the Outdoor Chaplain and member of Church of the Loving Shepherd)

December 19—When you pass through the waters, I will be with you and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you; when you walk through the fire you shall not be burned and the flame shall not consume you. (Book of Isaiah, C43, v2)

December 20—You become what you give your attention to. (Epictetus, 50-135 CE, Greek teacher of Stoic philosophy of logic, ethics and temperance)

December 21—Gardening taught me things I didn't even know I was learning about, patience and care taking, but most importantly about disturbance as a condition of growth, that solid ground has to be plowed up for new seeds to take root. (*Fire Shut Up in My Bones*, Charles Blow, American journalist and commentator)

December 22—Understand this well, there is something holy, something divine hidden in the most ordinary situations, and it is up to each one of you to discover. (St Josemaria Escriversa, 1902-1975 CE, Spanish Roman Catholic priest who founded Opus Dei, an organization that teaches everyone is called to holiness in ordinary life)

December 23—A wise man fills his brain before emptying his mouth. (African proverb)

December 24 (Fourth Sunday of Advent Christmas Eve) —Circle me Lord, keep peace within and keep evil out. (Rev David Adam, 1936-2020 CE, Anglican priest and writer of prayers in the Celtic pattern)

December 25(Christmas)—Lead us from death to life, from falsehood to truth. Lead us from despair to hope, from fear to trust. Lead us from hate to love, from war to peace. Let peace fill our lives, our world, our universe. Peace, peace, peace. (Universal Prayer for Peace, the Iona Community, an ecumenical Christian community working for justice and peace)

December 26—Our role in life is to bring the light of our own souls to the dim places around us. (Sr. Joan Chittister, American Benedictine nun, passionate advocate of peace, human rights and women's issues)

December 27—If you see what needs to be repaired and how to repair it, then you have found a piece of the world that God has left for you to complete. But if you only see what is wrong and what is ugly in the world, then it is you yourself that needs repair. (Lubavitcher Rebbe--Menachem Mendel Schneerson, 1902-1994 CE, Seventh leader of Chabad Lubavitcher movement)

December 28—Use what talents you possess. The woods will be very silent if no birds sing there except those that sing best. (Henry Van Dyke, 1852-1933 CE, versatile poet, writer and minister)

December 29—Religion is at its best when it makes us ask hard questions of ourselves. It is at its worst when it deludes us into thinking we have all the answers for everyone else. (Archibald MacLeish, 1892-1982 CE, American poet and writer)

December 30—Hope is not always safe and lovely, she is not always cascading rivers and sunlit skies, dancing, hope knows there is work to be done. (Ullie-Kaye, Canadian poet, writes for a world that needs repair)

December 31 —It is requisite for the relaxation of the mind that we make use, from time to time, of playful deeds and jokes. (St Thomas Aquinas, 1225-1274 CE, Italian friar and priest, influential philosopher and theologian)

January 1—In school, a teacher lays out work for his pupils. I resolve to accept each situation of this year as God's layout for that hour and never to lament that it is commonplace or a disappointing task. One can pour something divine into every situation. (*Letters by a Modern Mystic*, Frank Laubach 1884-1970 CE, Congregational Christian missionary and mystic)

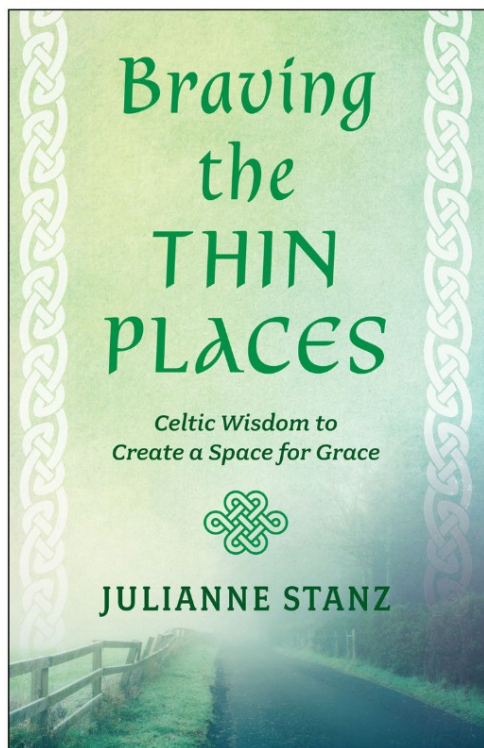
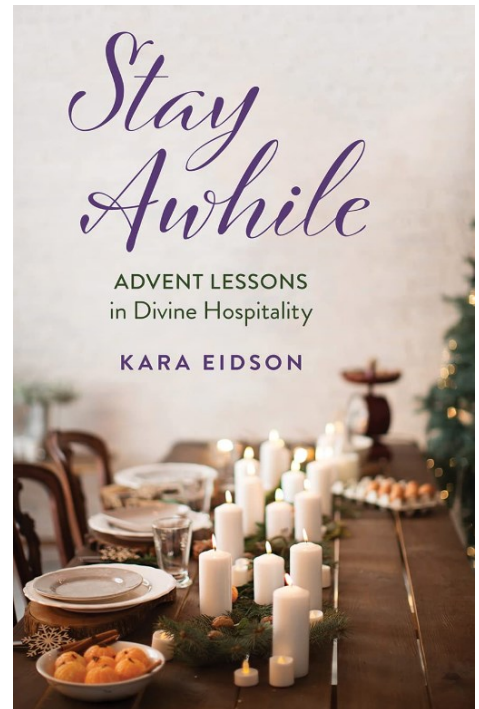

With over 20 volunteers to help and a perfect November weather day we were able to pack and deliver the makings of a Thanksgiving dinner and ShopRite gift cards to the 48 families who participate in our Food Delivery Program. As always this delivery was festive and fun with a wide array of wonderful fresh and non-perishable foods donated by The Chester County Food Bank and gift cards provided by our CLS community.

Once again, for our Christmas delivery on **Friday, December 15th**, our Food Ministry will be able give \$50 in ShopRite gift cards, and a bounty of donated fresh produce, eggs, cheese, non-perishable foods and paper towels to our participating families. If you have an hour or two to spare on **Fridays, December 15th and January 19th** (weather permitting) we can really use your help. Meet us in the Barn Pantry around 8:30 AM. We will pack food, load our cars and leave CLS around 9:30 AM for deliveries. We are usually finished by 10:30 AM if not before and deliver in pairs or groups.

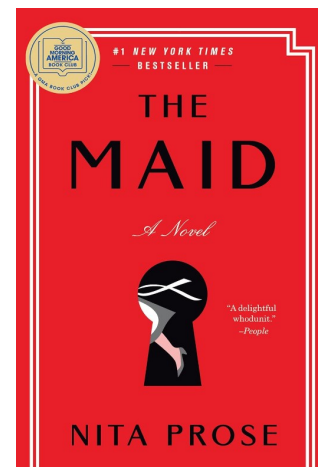
The generosity of the CLS community knows no bounds. It is with great joy and abundant thanksgiving that we can report that once again our Thanksgiving Special Offering during the month of November has been a huge success. In fact it has surpassed our goal!! Currently, at this counting, our CLS family has donated \$12,287 which is over our goal of \$12,000. This will easily allow our Food Ministry to continue to deliver \$35 ShopRite gift cards for 9 months of the year to up to 48 families who participate in our Food Delivery Program and \$50 ShopRite gift cards during the holiday months of Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. These gift cards allow our participants to choose some of the food and additional items they need. Your continued generosity and constant care enable our Food Delivery Program to remain strong and provide donated food, paper towels and ShopRite gift cards to about 80 individuals young and old (from 4-97!) every month. Together we are helping our neighbors combat food insecurity and are making a difference. Thank you. Thank you.
